

UPCOMING EVENTS


The Castle Minstrels: October 29 2:00 PM

This summer the Blockhouse Museum was very proud to work with the **Akwesasne Cultural Centre and Museum** to improve our acknowledgment of Aboriginal peoples. As part of our celebration of Canada 150, the Akwesasne Cultural Centre and Museum loaned the Blockhouse Museum an exhibit showcasing the game of Lacrosse. This exhibit explored the legendary Akwesasne origins of Lacrosse, as given to the Akwesasne nation by the Sky Spirits. This exhibit provided a deep and insightful overview of Akwesasne culture, and MDHS looks forward to furthering our understanding of Canada's indigenous peoples.



Celebrating Canada 150

In honor of Canada 150, MDHS participated in several special events during the 2017 season. These included:

- Special costumed tours for the passengers of the Kawartha Voyageur Riverboat.
- The Akwesasne La-Crosse Exhibit.
- Expanded events on Canada Day and during Canal Fest.
- A special talk by Paul Fortier about Foods of 1867, with samples of scotch egg and haggis fritters.

Museum Statistics

During the 2017 season the Blockhouse Museum was happy to welcome visitors from exotic places such as Serbia, New Zealand, and Kemptville. Between May and October 2017, the Blockhouse Museum was visited by **10,637** people. This surpasses the visitor count of 2016 (10,251 visitors), making 2017 the Blockhouse Museum's best season ever. A huge thank-you goes out to the volunteers, workers, and supporters who made this possible!

The Blockhouse Festival



On July 17th and 18th we commemorated the centuries leading to 1867, from pre-contact First Nations to the Fenians Raids on the eve of Confederation. Re-enactors, heritage exhibitors, and historians from Ontario, Quebec, and New York brought history to life with displays of traditional wampum, contemporary First Nation crafts, 18th-century quilting, leather work, military and navy encampments, United Empire Loyalist presentations, and local Tweedsmuir Histories. New was the Saturday-evening entertainment provided by Barry's Bay Fiddler Ken Ramsden, and Natasha Smoke Santiago of the Storyteller House from Akwesasne, involving the presentation of Mohawk dances and legends. A big thank-you to all participants! If you have ideas about events you would like to see at next year's Festival, please let us know.

The Tallman Exhibit



MDHS is proud to announce the accession of a brand-new display honoring **Lt. Stanley Bliss Tallman**. Lt. Tallman was born in Merrick-ville in 1892, and in 1914 enlisted in the Royal Canadian Dragoons at Valcartier, Quebec. Lt. Tallman served in France during World War I, and died on November 5th, 1918. He was 26 years old.

MDHS is honored to commemorate Lt. Tallman's life and death with this display, donated by Mr. Gordon Tallman. The Tallman display will make its first appearance at the Merrickville Legion for November 11th, 2017.
